The seminar explored key geopolitical and economic issues involving India and China, in

an evolving global order. Sr. Col. Zhou Bo and Amb. Vijay Nambiar emphasised the

complex interplay between economic diplomacy, strategic priorities, and international

relations in the current international environment.

The speakers discussed India's position as a growing economic power and its efforts to

balance self-reliance and global engagement. The speakers argued that India's role in

multilateral organisations, and its strategic priorities in the Indo-Pacific are vital to

shaping its future economic diplomacy and geopolitical influence. Additionally, the

importance of India's economic and security partnerships, particularly with global powers

like the United States, China, and Russia, was highlighted.

Sr. Col. Zhou discussed China's rise and its relationship with the West, arguing that the

"liberal international order" is a Western construct, and highlighted the need for a

multipolar and more inclusive global system. Other issues covered in the discussion were

China's growing influence in global governance and the significance of its engagements

with emerging economies, including its contributions to BRICS and its approach to

regional stability.

- The speakers debated the evolving role of multilateral institutions in fostering global stability. It was pointed out that institutions such as the United Nations, BRICS, and the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation have become more critical in addressing global challenges. Countries like India and China, despite their differences, share common ground in pushing for a more diversified and equitable global governance structure one that reflects the voices and interests of emerging economies.
- The discussion also dwelt on the future trajectory of India-China relations, particularly with regard to border issues and economic cooperation. The speakers emphasised that while tensions exist, especially in the context of the border issue, both countries must focus on maintaining peace and stability. The importance of enhancing confidence-building measures was emhpasised, as this would facilitate bilateral trade and promote joint efforts toward international peacekeeping missions. Such steps are critical to fostering a more positive and collaborative India-China relationship which would reflect the growing influence of emerging economies and promote a more balanced international system.
